

Emergency Calls – 6:11 Non-Emergency Calls – 19:51



# Crimes Against Persons – Violent Crime 15.7% Decrease Compared to Last Year

- Decrease in violent crime compared to last year can be attributed to significant decrease in assault offenses
- Most violent crime, particularly homicides and assaults, can be attributed to high-risk behavior to include drug and gang activity and personal disputes among acquaintances
- The risk of victimization remains low for the average resident and San Antonio remains a safe city

# Crimes Against Property 3.4% Increase Compared to Q1 Last Year

- Primary driver of the increase is motor vehicle theft
- Most property crimes are crimes of opportunity taking advantage of easy targets
- The Department meets regularly with residents and businesses to share prevention strategies
- June 2023 Department will implement enhancements to the Property Crime Unit to increase visibility and proactivity
